

## Brodick Manse Autumn 2014

For many Arran folk, despite our own tourist season being much extended nowadays. October is still traditionally the time they take their annual holiday. I too have just returned from a two week break exploring among other places the Pembroke coast.

Many of you will also have been off island over the October holiday period, no doubt some further afield to guaranteed sunshine before the winter sets in. It does us all good to broaden our horizons, see new places, experience other cultures and meet new people. Perhaps, it is more important for us as islanders to do so, otherwise we might get too island bound.

Arran is an extremely beautiful place. It is also a hard place to leave. No matter where I go in the world I can't help comparing it to Arran and asking the question: could I live here? Although I have found some stunning places in my travels, so far I have yet to find anywhere more beautiful, or anywhere else I would rather live.

Leaving Arran would, I suspect, always feel like living in exile. It is a feeling perhaps only islanders can truly experience. This is wonderfully summed up in the words of a Skye minister writing about leaving his native isle, when he wrote:

> A lamp-lit quay that glitters in the rain. And by its side a steamboat waiting dawn. The daylight strengthens, and the sirens sound: The last rope splashes, and the engines churn; The quayside fades. O misty isle, it seems as if no time to leave thee could be found More fitting than the hour in which men turn From sleeping, and, reluctant lose their dreams.

So I for one am glad to be home again to the place I feel I belong to, will always feel I belong, as to no other place. It is almost as if I am bound to Arran by some invisible umbilical cord that ever draws me back. I suspect for many of you this is also your experience, whether native or long-term local to these shores.

The only other cord I feel as strongly is the one that draws me to church, to worship my Maker, the Creator of heaven and earth, and this beautiful place I call home, and feel at home. I feel at home in church too. I long for it when I am absent from it. Why that should be the case, perhaps simply down to the habit of a life-time. Once a habit forms it is difficult to break. Yet I suspect, were I to be absent from it for a time, it might be difficult to return. Indeed I know it to be the case. The only time I found it difficult to get to church was when my children were very young. Sleepless nights, wee ones that took a lot of organizing to get ready for church early on a Sunday morning - a Sunday morning which was the only day freed from the pressures of work when I got an opportunity to spend precious time with my family. So for a year or two. Sunday worship was difficult and my attendance at church was sporadic. It took a very strong desire to pull me back to regular attendance once more.

Once we get out of the habit of going to church, for whatever reason, it is always difficult to return, especially as often we can feel others looking and perhaps thinking "my I haven't seen them for a while". Yet of course nothing could be further from the truth. I guarantee there would be nothing but rejoicing to see another face among the regular worshipers and the warmest of welcomes for anyone drawn back to worship after an absence. Hence to make it as easy as possible for people to do just that, perhaps after being away for some time, once a year we have a special 'Come to Church Sunday'.

This year at Brodick we will celebrate our 'Come to Church Sunday' on the 23<sup>rd</sup> November. To make it even easier to respond to this and so that there will be no awkwardness in having to step across the kirk threshold alone, invitations will be given by family, friends, or neighbours to come along with them.

I hope many reading this will take the opportunity to come to church and reconnect with a sacred and special place in their affections. Rest assured a warm 'homecoming' welcome is ever waiting.

#### **Property Report**

#### Manse

The main hallway and upper corridor decoration work, the main entrance flooring, and the fascia to the garage remain outstanding. Hopefully all items will be completed by the end of the month.

#### Hall

A new pin board has been fitted for the use of the Sunday School in the small hall. Light bulbs and smoke detector batteries have been replaced where necessary. The curtains covering the sliding doors have been repaired. Thanks are due to Nancy Macleod for her needle work. The hall floor has had its annual varnish. The kitchen cupboard has been secured with a new padlock. Quotations are awaited for replacement doors to the chair store, and the toy cupboard. These have to be solid core doors. A single replacement door in the small hall is also required. There has been evidence of vermin in the hall. Please be aware that all perishable goods should be in a sealed container or jar if being left in a cupboard. I have cancelled the quotation for the sound system for the hall and am at present seeking an alternative quotation.

#### Church

Glazing repairs were completed to the church prior to the fitting of the perspex. A start has been made to fit the perspex to the tower openings. Regretfully a large number of sheets were damaged on arrival on the site and have to be replaced. The door to the electrical box in the tower has been secured. During August bats were found to be nesting in the loft. They are a protected species and on the advice of Mr Smythe, the vermin controller, they were left alone. He advised that during October they would depart for warmer climes. Nevertheless he will vacuum the loft area to remove droppings which have been there for years. The bats will return next year. The floor adjacent to the pulpit has been checked and there was no evidence of rot. The back boards in two of the pews need attention as the feathers in the wood having split. Quotations are awaited to reinstate the pulpit handrail and to establish a method of replacing light bulbs in the chandeliers, without going up into the loft. A Fire Risk Assessment has been requested by Presbytery and will be made available to all who use the premises.

#### **External Works**

A thank you is extended to the AYF for painting the railings to the front elevation; a splendid job. New covers and shoes have been replaced at the foot of two rain water pipes.

A new frost cover has been replaced on the outside tap.

A new hut for the use of the AYF is now in position at the rear of the Church building. The paving slabs to the huts require a power wash to remove the algae.


