

The holiday season is well upon us once more and over the summer months to come the island will welcome tens of thousands of visitors. Among them will be friends, either coming to visit us for the first time, or returning for their annual pilgrimage. No doubt therefore, we will all at some point do the 'grand tour' and take a trip around the island with them to show them the sights. Being extremely proud of Arran's beauty I want them to see Arran at its best, preferably of course on a sunny day and also to show them a little of its culture and heritage. In the latter regard a visit to Brodick Castle and the Heritage Museum will be essential. Truth be told, I like playing the tourist myself for a day. We don't always appreciate what is on our door step and it is nice to look with fresh eyes at all our island home has to offer.

Being a minister I will also proudly show visitors inside the churches in the North Arran linkage at Brodick, Corrie, Lochranza, Pirnmill and Shiskine. Up until fairly recently, due to insurance requirement for our buildings to remain locked, that would have been possible for only a few like me who had a key. I always felt that was a great pity, especially when it seemed I was always able to go into churches elsewhere when I was on holiday myself.

I confess I hadn't got around to doing anything to rectify the situation, until someone told me that they had, in a moment of utter despair felt the urge to go to Brodick Church and pray, but had been stunned to find it locked.

Churches are places of sanctuary and as such should always be open and available to everyone and not just for one hour on a Sunday morning. So after consultation with all the relevant Kirk Sessions, Brodick Church is now open daily from Easter until the end of September from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., whilst Lochranza, Pirnmill and St Molios are left open all year round. Corrie Church alone remains locked, but at least contact details of how to obtain the key are pinned on the door to allow access at all times should it be required.

So, on your trip round the island with your summer visitors go into our churches and have a look round. There is much to see. Lochranza St Bride's boasts three hundred years of history and beautiful stained glass

panels, a nautically themed port-hole window, as well as a recently installed sky-light window commissioned for its tercentenary. Brodick St Bride's too has had a stunning new stained glass window installed in memory of the late Evelyn Sillars, complimenting the magnificent centenary wall hanging, which took two years of painstaking stitching by the ladies of the congregation to create. Pirnmill Church might stand in the middle of a field but is a 'tardis' of a building inside, which never fails to delight visitors, whilst Grade 'A' listed Corrie Church and St Molios, Shiskine are among the finest examples of the work of renowned architect John James Burnet's work.

You won't be disappointed and please don't forget to sign the visitor's book to let us know you have been.

Friends of Montrose House Association Spring 2015

The advent of the new Montrose House building is undoubtedly the most significant item of interest in recent weeks with the transfer of residents which took place, eventually, on 19th April 2015. '0 day' was carefully planned as a one day operation but it could equally be called 'The Longest Day' as numerous unforeseen technical problems had to be overcome in the preceding weeks. The official wording states, 'Whilst not without its challenges, our residents are now in their new home and seem to be settling in fine,' but it has to be said that the Manager and staff are to be congratulated on their exemplary devotion to duty during the greatly extended transition period. We have now been advised that the official opening date is fixed for 15th June 2015. Alas, we as a group are greatly disappointed that many of the points we raised at the numerous 'consultation' meetings along the way have clearly not been addressed despite positive assurances. We continue to lobby NAC management on such items as external water taps and outdoor power points for servicing equipment, external signage, invasive noise, light and CCTV intrusion on adjacent properties, and the woefully inadequate site parking provision.

Events in which we have been involved since the move to the new site include the traditional Burns Supper with the Clarke family and other young people providing the entertainment, the Easter Baskets competition organised by Ellie Jones, and the formal dedication of the new building by the Chaplain, Rev Angus Adamson at the first in-house service of worship after the move. Also the dedication of the Stained Glass Window in Brodick Church in memory of Evelyn Sillars was recognised at the Easter in-house Sunday service since several residents and their visitors had contributed to the appeal fund and had connections with Evelyn who opened the original building in 1974. We have arranged for a dog carving by Marvin Elliott, in memory of Stella Macrae, to be placed at the end of a corridor in-house and several new bird tables and nesting boxes to be placed in the grounds outside in view of residents from their rooms. Several new tubs have been purchased and planted with colourful spring plants with the help of members of the Arran Youth Foundation and placed outside the patio doors of each of the residents' rooms. We have also provided new brightly patterned oilskin tablecloths for daily use in colours complementing the decor of each dining room.

Plans for future events include the annual Summer Fete, the date of which is fixed for Wednesday 1st July 2015.

It is with sadness that we have to report the deaths of residents Agnes Boa, Elma Kerr, Isobel Pointer and Christina Hamilton. Memorial services were held as appropriate.

Daffodil Cross

The vestibule of the church was decorated for the Easter Celebration services with the iconic daffodil cross which was introduced by the late Mrs Evelyn Sillars in her capacity as Flower Convenor. Mrs Ann Lauder and Mrs Liz Lawrie, assisted by family here for the Easter holiday, undertook the construction, collecting 'a host of golden daffodils' from the gardens of Lady Jean Fforde, the derelict garden of the old Montrose House and others. The moveable date of Easter coupled with the vagaries of the weather make it difficult to obtain sufficient numbers of suitable blooms of a constant colour but the resultant work of floral art was a magnificent achievement and greatly enhanced the entrance of the church. Indeed, such was the abundance of material available that the theme was repeated on the internal window ledges and the master arrangement at the front of the organ. Sadly the blooms have very limited life but when the cross was dismantled the number of flowers was meticulously counted and may form the subject of a 'Guess the number of daffodils' feature at a future Church Fete!

St Bride's Ladies

The second half of the session got off to a good start in January with a very interesting talk on "Old Brodick" from John Sillars.

This was followed by our annual Scot's Night which was almost a disaster due to an electricity failure about 40 minutes before commencement. Thankfully, after much concern, this was eventually resolved and the evening proceeded as normal. After the usual haggis supper, we had some delightful entertainment from several very talented High School pupils.

At our next meeting we were transported to America by Graham Chappell. Accompanied by slides, Graham gave a very interesting talk about his favourite holiday resort- Palm Springs.

On 23rd February we heard about Beith furniture from Allan Richardson. Few of us, while perhaps possessing some items in our homes, were aware of the extent of their work which included the fitting out of some of the well known luxury liners. This talk was illustrated by slides of some beautiful examples of Beith furniture. Our session ended with the A.G.M. on 16th March when office bearers and committee were re-elected.

Jean Hunter then spoke about her journey from the start of her studies through to becoming a Parish Assistant. We were all greatly impressed by Jean's dedication, commitment and heavy workload.

The Easter Fayre, in spite of the weather and conflicting events, raised the worthwhile sum of £585.00.

We now 'look forward' to the Highland Games when, as usual, we would appreciate assistance from out with the committee for catering and serving on the day. Lists will appear in due course.

Arran Churches Together

The Service of Christian Unity was held in St. Bride's, Brodick on 18th January, a bright but very icy day. There were some very slippery patches near the church which able-bodied folk kindly helped those less able to negotiate. The service was ably conducted by a lady minister from London, and afterwards members of churches from around the island were able to chat over tea or coffee in the Memorial Hall

This year's World Day of Prayer was held in the lovely little church in Lochranza on Friday 6th March - a day of sunshine and showers and strong wind. It was a thought provoking and well constructed service, devised by the women of the Bahamas and promoting unconditional love and service. The offering, amounting to £242.40, was for the World Day of Prayer projects in the Bahamas.

Around 50 people participated in The Annual Walk of Witness on Good Friday, 3rd April. After a short address by Father Noel Colford at Holy Cross Church, the worshippers processed slowly and solemnly, behind the wooden cross, to St. Brides, where the Rev. Angus Adamson delivered another short address, and the story of the Crucifixion was read, with great drama and poignancy, by the Rev.

Alan Thompson. Afterwards, we adjourned to the Memorial Hall for tea, biscuits and a chance to chat with members of other denominations.

Stained Glass Memorial Window

A stained glass window in memory of Evelyn Sillars was formally dedicated at the end of the Easter Sunday church service on 6th April. The church was well filled with visitors and members of the congregation for the traditional service of Easter hymns, bible readings and prayers with a mezzo soprano solo introit and voluntary sung by Mrs. Helen Cruddis, a visitor from Shetland and daughter of Geoff and Margaret Collins of Brodick.

The final item in the Order of Service was the dedication of the stained glass window. A full size model of the window, placed on an easel in front of the pulpit, was unveiled and Lady Jean Fforde gave a brief outline of Evelyn's life of service to the community and the church. She made reference to the fact that they had both served at Bletchley Park during service in the second World War, Lady Jean in the Red Cross and Evelyn in the WAAF. However, such was the high level of security that they didn't discover this till later!

In the afternoon the model was taken to Montrose House and displayed at the weekly in-house Service of Worship, for the benefit of residents and their visitors, some of whom had contributed to the appeal fund and had connections with Evelyn who opened the original building in 1974. It is of significance to note that it was largely due to her influence that the need for a residential care home on the island was established in her capacity as Scotland's first woman County Convenor on Bute County Council.

Many thanks are due to all who contributed to the project and to Richard Leclerc for creating such a beautiful design which greatly enhances the church.

CHURCH FETE

This year's church Fete will be held on **Saturday 18th July** at 2pm, which we hope will be as successful as in recent years.

During the week leading up to the Fete youngsters and adult minders will be parading Shore Road seeking to sell entries for the Duck Derby. Alison Bilsland (303505) would be very grateful to hear from any small volunteers to wear the duck costume and others to accompany them.
