

Dear All

When with the heaviest of hearts I announced on the 10th March my painful decision to demit as minister at Brodick linked with Corrie linked with Lochranza & Pirnmill linked with Shiskine, I nor anyone else present could for a moment have envisaged the current situation we now find ourselves in as the impact of the Carona Virus is felt nationwide. Whilst my reasons for feeling utterly compelled to give up my charge remain the same, circumstances in all our lives have altered beyond imagining. To walk away from ministry here in North Arran at such a time, especially when as never before in modern times, people both within our congregations and beyond in the wider community are seeking spiritual support and comfort, would I feel be a gross dereliction of my calling to the ministry of Word and sacrament in the Church of Scotland and as your minister in particular.

I have therefore now intimated my decision to the Presbytery Clerk not to demit my charge on Easter Sunday as planned, and I will endeavour to the very best of my ability continue to discharge my duties as minister of the North Arran linkage, for as long as I possibly can, until the situation or circumstances dictate otherwise.

In the present circumstances it was a very strange Easter, no family, friends or visitors to welcome back to the island and our churches empty and locked to keep people out. At least thanks to modern technology, Jean and I are managing to record and send out weekly worship via the church websites. Keeping in touch via e-mail and phone also ensures we can communicate with everyone, especially those who need a little bit of pastoral support. Unfortunately, Montrose House and the hospital remain out of bounds, but we continue to pray for those completely shut off from the outside world, trusting them to the care of wonderful and dedicated staff striving heroically in the front line of the fight against Covid 19.

But if the message of Easter tells us anything, it is that after the darkness of the tomb, comes the joy of resurrection. The love of God cannot be shut away from the world, nor can the world shut it out. It continually seeks to break free and it is constant in the rain and the sunshine of our lives, both in the here and now, and for all eternity.

Although for now, we cannot know how long this present crisis will last, we continue to hope that sooner or later better days do lie ahead. One thing is for sure, the wonderful fellowship we share a St Bride's, as well as the other churches in the linkage and the wonderful community spirit we know here in Brodick and indeed around the island, will see us through.

Until that hoped for time comes, may the joy at the heart of the Easter message seep into your very being and restore your weary souls, for Christ has risen, he has risen indeed. Halleluiah.

Arran Churches Together Foodbank

How does the foodbank normally work?

The regular foodbank volunteers collect donations from the basket in the big Co and store them in the transept, along with other donations left in the vestibule. This store is used to top up the vestibule shelves so that those in need can help themselves without a reference from Health, Social Services or Education. We do work in partnership with these agencies all of whom have sought support from the foodbank for individuals and families known to them. Jean Hunter is our treasurer and manages any monetary donations made to the Food and Fuel fund which is used to buy household fuel – normally organised along with Social Services – and to supplement food items when needed. We note the number of items used to top up the vestibule shelves each day and Ann Hart pulls the figures together every month. These figures are shared with the Arran Churches Together committee, North Ayrshire Council and are displayed in Brodick Church vestibule.

Through the work of the Arran Economic Group and other bodies we understand that the cost of private and social housing rentals on Arran is much higher than in other areas. Private rental can be substandard accommodation, poorly insulated and damp, and the cost of heating these properties can create fuel poverty. Due to the cost of transporting goods to the island food tends to be more expensive. The rise of in-work poverty has been driven by all of these factors. During school holidays we see an increase in use of the foodbank, presumably because families whose children receive free school meals find themselves under financial pressure during holidays. Along with everyone else, we find ourselves dealing with a situation we'd never dreamed about and we've had to adapt the way we work, making changes as we respond to guidelines and need.

What has been the response to Covid-19?

By March 20th we had established a bank of delivery drivers. These drivers volunteered through Arran Community for Voluntary Services (ACVS) and agreed to safeguarding and confidentiality statements. Initially we advertised a delivery service only to those people having to self-isolate. At the end of March, we changed this service to deliver to anyone, not just those self-isolating, in order to reduce footfall in the vestibule. We have created a Facebook page - Arran Churches Together Foodbank -and have posted a message offering this delivery service.

The doors from the vestibule into the church are now locked; the general public only have access to the vestibule. 'High touch areas' such as door handles, light switches, and fridge doors are being cleaned on a daily basis by Ann, Catriona, Ann, and Susan. There is advice on the church door about how to keep a social distance while using the foodbank and hand sanitiser is available with advice to use before and after using the foodbank.

The foodbank will continue as normal with our regular volunteers collecting donations from the Brodick Coop collection basket and keeping the vestibule shelves in Brodick Church stocked, for those who are struggling financially to be able to help themselves.

Our regular volunteers have used an agreed list to make up bags with enough food for up to 2 people for at least 3 days. These are stored in the church ready for uplift.

North Ayrshire Council is providing weekly food boxes to families whose children normally receive free school meals. This has helped many of the families we expected would need to use the foodbank; although foodbank use has increased, we are coping with demand.

How can we continue making donations?

For those who are still shopping in Brodick Co, the collection basket is still there and we are still emptying it; for those who are placing an order for delivery with Brodick Co, you can add an item to your list which they will put in the collection basket. Donations can also be left in the church vestibule.

We owe thanks to many people:

To all of you who have offered help and enquired about how we are getting on.

To everyone who continues to donate, the Coop basket continues to be filled.

To shops, hotels, cafes and businesses which unfortunately have had to close or reduce hours, for donating food items close to their date. To individuals, Arran Singers and Faith in Community Scotland for donations made.

To the volunteer delivery drivers.

To ACVS and Brodick Coop for their continued support.

If you are aware of anyone who could benefit from Foodbank support please let them know that they can access food from the church vestibule 24/7 or receive a delivery.
