

Brodick Manse January 2015

n our Presbyterian tradition a huge amount of focus on worship is put on breaching. Although nowadays, by and large shorter than in bygone years, he sermon is still seen as the main event of every service and it is an inusual, out of the ordinary service, that doesn't have one.

well remember on my first day, in a placement as a student in training for ninistry with Rev Dr Ian MacLeod at Brodick lw Corrie, asking how I should spend my time and what was expected of me, being told in words o the effect "here you will stand or fall by how you perform in the pulpit on a Sunday morning. Therefore how you organise your time and what you lo in the rest of the week will be dictated by ensuring your sermon is always properly prepared in time for worship."

The rough rule of thumb is that for every minute preached, it takes an hour n preparation. If only... it takes me much, much longer than that to get to grips with a passage of scripture and tease out an idea with the aid of commentaries and wider reading. I can vouch for the truism that 'sermons are ninety-nine percent perspiration and one percent inspiration.' My efforts are normally around 15 minutes — that is 5 and a bit pages of A4 paper in a 14 font, which relates to about 20 hours spent in the study. And still there is the Children's Talk, prayers and hymns to sort out. Yet for all that, sermons are just a snap shot, a moment in time, heard and then mostly lost forever, much of what is said instantly forgotten. So is all that effort worth it? Ultimately you are the judge of that, but it is my constant hope that my efforts in some way help my congregations engage with the great Christian truths and teachings contained within the Bible, the eternal word of God and in such a way that is relevant to modern day life.

Despite years of academic study I don't have all the answers concerning God's revelation to humankind. As prof George Newlands of Trinity College wisely said, "the day we know all there is to know about God is the day he ceases to be God". 'His ways are not our ways, nor are his thoughts as our thoughts'.

Anyway it isn't what I believe that is of great consequence, but what you believe. It must always be remembered that the greatest underlying principle of the Reformation was to give everyone the gift of being able to hear the Word of God preached in their own language, that they might

understand its message and be able to read the bible for themselves. Long gone are the days when the pulpit stood ten feet above contradiction. I can have faith only for myself. My sermons are only my own personal opinion, albeit an opinion hammered out through much academic study and theological training, an opinion that avoids heresy and allowed to be given publicly only under licence from Presbytery, to whom I am answerable. Therefore my sermons are just a starting point, an aid to help you engage with what the Bible says and to come to your own understanding of faith. I am equally delighted when people strongly disagree with what I say in the pulpit as when they embrace it wholeheartedly. Sometimes, as happened recently concerning the miracle of the feeding of the five thousand, both occur at the same time. At least it means folk haven't fallen asleep and have actually listened for some of the 15 minutes! And for the record, despite my thoughts on that particular incident in the ministry of our Lord, I do believe that as the Son of God, Jesus could and did perform many miracles.

Apart from at Lochranza, where there is a 5-10 minute discussion session with the congregation after the sermon, there isn't time to receive feedback about what I have said on a Sunday morning. There is though usually a moment or two over coffee for comment. Failing that, theological discussion is ever welcome and I can always be contacted by telephone or e-mail. As your minister your faith matters a great deal to me. But when all is said and done, it is my greater hope, that your faith matters more to you, enough at least to come to your own conclusions.

<u>Friends of Montrose House Association</u> Winter 2015 Report.

As the old year passes and the New Year begins it seems an appropriate analogy for the present situation at Montrose House with the long awaited move from the old building to the new-build establishment in Glen Cloy.

The transfer of residents, their belongings and equipment is now imminent and will take place in a carefully planned and efficiently managed operation. A group of Friends will be on hand on to provide assistance and additional support to staff in an effort to minimize the trauma of this major upheaval in their lives.

We have yet to be advised of the date but have been assured that an official event will be arranged in due course to commemorate the opening of the new building. An in-house service of dedication is planned for Sunday 1st February. Meanwhile we have been advised that, at our request, the original wooden plaque in the foyer of the present building, commemorating its opening by Mrs. Evelyn Sillars in 1974, will be placed in the Relatives Lounge of the new establishment and it is proposed that it will be informally named as 'The Sillars Suite' in her memory.

Events leading up to the end of the year went ahead successfully albeit with some uncertainty of the venue as 'D' Day was postponed several times. The Christmas Party was planned for a Saturday to fit in with available facilities at the new site but this proved difficult as staff levels at weekends are minimal. This, coupled with a high level of absence due to sickness, necessitated a substantial input from Friends and others to set up, supervise and clear up after the event. However, all went well on the day.

Plans for future events are well in hand with the traditional Burns Supper at the end of January once again in the capable hands of the Clarke family. An Easter Baskets/Bonnets competition is planned for April as usual.

Property Report

May I take this opportunity of wishing all friends and members of the congregation, a GOOD NEW YEAR, health and happiness.

Manse

Following on from the damage caused by the leaking pipe from the dishwasher, the new kitchen units, together with associated works, will be reinstated shortly. The cost of the work involved will be approximately £5,000. The insurance claim will fall short of the total cost of reinstatement since only the damaged parts of the works are relevant to the claim. As the units date from 1991 it is impossible to match them with the undamaged units so they will also have to be replaced. The insurers have agreed, eventually, to make a small contribution towards the undamaged section of the works of £500. A new cable to the dishwasher with isolator is also required. Wall tiling will also have to be replaced.

As a fault has been discovered in the lighting circuit, the annual test on the power, lighting and appliances in the Manse will be put in

hand.

Following on instruction from Presbytery AN ENERGY CERTICATE is now in place for the Manse. The report suggested it would be worthwhile strapping the inside walls of the garage which were back to back with the entrance hallway and bedroom 4, applying breather membrane to outer face with 20mm gap from wall, 10mm plywood finish to garage side with 50mm Kingspan IW55 insulation fitted between the studs. The painter work to the hallway is now complete apart from the floor varnishing, which will be carried out following the kitchen reinstatement. The leak in the master bedroom ceiling is still being monitored.

The contents insurance cover for the manse from 2015 now covers white goods together with floor coverings i.e. carpets, linoleum etc. The Annual Manse inspection jointly with John Kerr of Corrie

Church is due shortly.

Hall

Guards for the loud speakers are in place. A coat of varnish will complete the work. The new doors for the hall are under manufacture. The microphone system is now in use and is believed to be beneficial to all.

The vermin question has been tackled with the appropriate poison

being laid as a deterrent.

The carbon monoxide and smoke detectors have had their annual service. I thank Michael Grant for his assistance.

Again Presbytery has asked that Fire Risk Assessments are in place for the Annual Report and Attestation. This Assessment will be

carried out on 15th January. 2015

Church

The perspex for the windows has now been replaced, and the sheets have been cut to size. Weather permitting the perspex will be fitted and work completed week beginning12th January 2015. Light bulbs which shine on the stain glass windows externally have been replaced. Smoke detectors have all been serviced. I hope to be able to give you an update on the chandeliers and lighting down both sides of the church on the next report. The paving slabs have been power washed. The downpipes at the side door and the corner of the tower appear to be blocked.

The Chancellor announced in his last Autumn Statement that for all church buildings a temporary repair fund had been set up for church roofs of between £10,000 and £100,000 to meet urgent repairs. This window of opportunity would close on 30th January 2015. To qualify for this grant, the need for it would have to have been reported in the last quinquennial report. As our church roof is maintained annually and the odd slate replaced when necessary, we obviously do not

require to make use of this grant.

For the record I have been asked to sign The Data Protection Act.
