

Brodick Manse February 2016

Recently I had to send a letter verifying the church attendance, whilst on Arran, of the children of regular visitors, to help ensure that they would be eligible to be enrolled at a Church of England school in London. For that to be possible, worship every Sunday was a mandatory requirement. With competition for places at a good school in many areas south of the border at a premium, by providing great education, the Church of England can use this carrot and stick approach to ensure their Sunday School rolls in such places are kept at a healthy level, whether or not parents are particularly church minded or not.

I'm sure there are good theological arguments to justify this approach, as no doubt there are good theological arguments for having denominational schools, be they Roman Catholic, Church of England, Quaker or otherwise, where Christian principles and ethos are part of the everyday curriculum. Despite some calls for the Church of Scotland to do likewise cropping up periodically at the General Assembly, the Kirk has quite doggedly declined to follow suit. It isn't that we couldn't do with a boost to falling Sunday School rolls – for we certainly could – it is rather down to a different approach to mission and outreach.

At the heart of that is our parish system, which seeks to ensure a territorial ministry for every parish in the land. Admittedly some parishes like ours at Brodick share a minister and parish Assistant with Corrie, Lochranza, Pirnmill and Shiskine, and others often also a place of worship, but still the aim is to provide a Church of Scotland presence and witness at the heart of every community in the land, not just to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, but in imitation of their Lord, to serve all who live within the bounds of every parish, church and non-church alike.

Therefore, it is felt that educating Church of Scotland children in a distinct denominational school would undermine that whole principle. Instead of being involved in the everyday life of a community through the local school or schools in the area, we would be encouraging our children to be separate from it. After all, just as Jesus ensured he got alongside people where they were, so He calls Christians to witness in the real world, to engage with it, not separate themselves from it.

It isn't that in the Kirk we don't take Christian education of children and young people as of paramount importance, for we most certainly do, but we would never seek to compel anyone to accept Christ. Jesus never entered anyone's life by force, but waits to be invited, as the famous painting the 'Light of the World' by Holman Hunt illustrates so poignantly, 'Behold I stand at the door and knock, and if anyone should hear my voice and open the door I will come in'.

Invitation to be allowed access to religious education of children in schools here too is at the discretion of the Head Teacher. Jean and I are immensely grateful to be allowed to be involved with all our primary schools at Corrie, Pirnmill and Shiskine as well as at Brodick and to have the wonderful opportunity to get to know the children and to tell them something of the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ, thus enabling them to make their own minds up about Him.

As to their wider knowledge, there is never any fear here, that our children receive anything other than a fabulous education. Besides excellent and dedicated teachers that is partly because our schools are not too big and each part of our island has its own school, which in a rural area like ours is also of immense importance for a well balanced and healthy community life of which the Kirk strives so hard to be a part.

The threat of the closure of Corrie School was for a time a real prospect, now thankfully averted, although there are always fears for the future of smaller schools like Corrie and Pirnmill, as indeed there are for smaller congregations like those at Corrie and Pirnmill churches. It is interesting to note that just as the parishes of Brodick, Corrie, Lochranza and Pirnmill share one minister, they now also share one Head Teacher responsible for Brodick, Corrie and Pirnmill Schools: for the present a good solution to a pressing problem. I hope it is an enduring solution and thus may both our schools and our churches remain open for the foreseeable future.

Friends of Montrose House Association Winter 2016 Report

As the old year passes and the New Year begins we take the opportunity to cast a backward eye on the past year's events and look forward to the future with eager anticipation.

Undoubtedly 2015 was the most traumatic in the 15 year existence of our organisation with the closing of the old building and the transfer to a new establishment further up the glen. Never was the official NAC corporate term 'CHALLENGE' more appropriate!

As noted in previous reports we as a group were hugely disappointed that many of the points we raised at the numerous 'consultation' meetings along the way had clearly not been addressed and we have had to resort to persistent lobbying of NAC management, with little effect to date, as many issues remain unresolved - not least of which is the appointment of a full time manager, preferably island based. The opening ceremony in June was very much a corporate affair organised by North Ayrshire Council in conjunction with the Joint Board of North Ayrshire Health and Social Care Partnership. There was remarkably little local involvement with invitations strictly limited.

In complete contrast the Annual Summer Fete, organised by ourselves, in close conjunction with Montrose House and Stronach Daycare staff, was a truly 'Open Day' with members of the public invited to come along and view the magnificent new building and contribute to our main fundraising event of the year.

Undoubtedly a most significant occurrence during the past year was the recognition of the need for and the establishment of a new organisation entitled 'Montrose House Residents Support Group', MHRSG. The Mission Purpose states 'To directly represent the interests and needs of the residents and to enhance communication for residents, relatives, and all relevant agencies involved with Montrose House'. This is entirely complementary to our organisation and we have already benefitted greatly from liaising with them in matters of common interest.

We look forward eagerly to the coming year and proving that 'Together We Make a Difference'.

The traditional events of Hallowe'en and Christmas Parties have taken place and proved a great success despite many difficulties experienced due to the changes in venue and senior staff who were previously involved. The new location certainly presents a huge challenge to artistes in projecting their voice over a span of 180 degrees!

At the time of writing plans are well advanced for the next event on the calendar, the Burns Supper in January, although we will greatly miss the contribution of the Clarke family for the entertainment this year.

Re-planting of external tubs with bulbs has proceeded despite the awful weather, with help from daycare. Looking to the year ahead there is much uncertainty surrounding the future role of Montrose House as indications are that consideration is being given to the appointment of additional nursing staff, thus changing the whole ethos of the establishment from Care Home to Nursing Home, reflecting the changing needs of residents. The reinstatement of the kitchen is now complete as is the varnish work to

he hall floor.

On lifting the linoleum adjacent to the back door it was discovered that the flooring was black where water had penetrated over a period. As new plywood was being laid on the existing flooring I decided to acquire two quotations to replace the wooden back door. Quotes not submitted as yet. Due to exceptionally bad weather the external woodwork has not been painted to date.

I have now instructed the joiner to proceed with the insulation to the back

wall of the garage. This will possibly be done in February.

I have asked the electrician to replace the fan in the downstairs toilet, and to check the ring circuits for power and lighting. There is now a fire extinguisher for use in the kitchen.

There has been a further blockage in the drain from the ladies toilet. Please take notice of the instruction on the wall regarding the toilet usage. Smoke detector batteries have been changed. Fluorescent tubes with starters have been replaced. Kitchen cutlery drawer is requiring attention.

The spot bulbs on the Cross have been changed to LED bright lights. The bulbs in the transept have also been changed where necessary. A damp patch has appeared on the floor of the bell tower which needs addressing. This item will require further investigation. I would hope to have the organ tuned in April/ May.
